

Taking a Stand



The Bishop Speaks

One of the things I have the pleasure of doing as Bishop is travelling to the parishes to confirm our young. During the Rite of Confirmation one by one the names of the candidates are called out and one by one they stand until all are standing. This first action in the Rite of Confirmation is not simply to "introduce" the candidates to the rest of the congregation. No, they are not standing for us. They are standing for God! It is as if each boy and girl hear God call their name and so their standing says, "Yes, here I am Lord, I am ready and I want to be confirmed. I want to live my life as a confirmed Catholic." We say a lot with this one simple gesture.

As they stand, I can tell by their hesitation and by the look on their faces that they feel somewhat uncomfortable standing up in front of so many people. This is natural and perfectly understandable, yet they still stand. This all says something about what it means to be a true disciple of Jesus Christ and a confirmed member of his body the Church. To be faithful to Jesus Christ means that we sometimes have to take a stand. We sometimes have to make choices that we know will draw the gaze and unwanted attention of others upon us.

Taking a stand makes us stand out from the crowd. We feel safe in the crowd; we feel vulnerable and exposed out the front of the crowd or at odds with the crowd. And the crowd can be very aggressive against anybody who dares take a stand that is at odds with the mentality of the current time. But I remember that Saint Paul said to the Christians in Rome "Do not be conformed to this world" sometimes translated as "Do not be conformed to this century" (Romans 12:2). Rather, we are called to conform ourselves to Jesus Christ, to follow and imitate *him*, and to make *his* thoughts our thoughts.

Recently Margaret Court, one of the greatest female





tennis players of all time and a devout Christian, became the victim of much public vitriol and condemnation because she took a stand and said that she believes marriage is between a man and a woman since that's what it says in the Bible. She dared to take a stand for Christ against the mentality of the current century and the world reacted.

When we take a stand for God, our faith, our Church, our neighbour, or our conscience we

won't likely receive the same degree of scrutiny or resentment Margaret Court since we don't share the same fame. But we will be scrutinised, possibly attacked, and maybe even hated. But remember Jesus said "If the world hates you remember that it hated me first" so we're not in bad company! As confirmed Catholics we must be prepared take stand, to

a charity working with oppressed Christians, every month 322 Christians are killed for their faith around the world. That's nearly 4,000 a year!

According to Open Doors,

remembering that as confirmed Catholics we have received the Gift of the Holy Spirit who has sealed us and stamped us as his own and given us the divine gift of fortitude.

I think of the fortitude of the many persecuted Christians throughout the world. If we look at Egypt as just one example, since Holy Week this year two of their Christian Churches have been bombed killing 45 Coptic Christians, and a gunned attack upon a busload of Christians on pilgrimage to a local monastery killed 29 Coptic Christians, including children. And this follows the 2015 kidnapping and horrific beheading of 21 Egyptian Christians on a beach in Libya because they would not renounce their faith in Christ.

According to *Open Doors*, a charity working with oppressed Christians, every month 322 Christians are killed for their faith around the world. That's

nearly 4,000 a year! *Open Doors* estimates that each month 214 church properties are destroyed and 722 acts of violence are perpetrated against Christians. Yet the Christians in these countries continue to come to Mass on Sundays; they continue to profess and live their faith; they continue to take a stand with and for Jesus Christ because they truly love him.

As I write these few words it is the feast day of Saint Charles Lwanga and his 21 companions who were

martyred in 1886 in Uganda for taking their stand. They refused to consent to the Kings immoral demands upon them and rebuked him for his debauchery. They took their stand with Christ rather than with worldy powers. the Post Communion Prayer for Mass on their Feast Day we pray "As we celebrate the victory of your holy martyrs; may

what helped them endure torment, we pray, make us, in the face of trials, steadfast in faith and charity."

From the time we take our stand at our Confirmation to the time we take our last breath we will often be called upon to make hard choices and side with Jesus Christ. Most of these times the stand we are called to take will be in little things, but occasionally it will be in big things. May the love and fortitude of the Holy Spirit assist us at these times.

Fatima Statue is coming to the Diocese of Armidale

Since the late 1950s, the Confraternity of Christ the Priest, a religious order based in the Diocese of Wagga Wagga, has been in possession of the Pilgrim Statue of Our Lady of Fatima, originating from Fatima Portugal in 1949. It travels throughout Australia promoting devotion to the Immaculate Heart of Mary and the apparitions of Our Lady of Fatima. The travelling statue had a significant impact on the various Australian Dioceses and Parishes that it visited in 1965.

The Confraternity of Christ the Priest from its inception has promoted the Immaculate Heart of Mary and the particular devotions of Our Lady of Fatima, and the Green Scapular.

At Fatima in 1917, the Blessed Virgin Mary announced, "Almighty God wishes to establish in the world devotion to my Immaculate Heart." The Confraternity has endeavored to do this now for over 60 years. It has conducted the perpetual novena to the Immaculate

Heart of Mary throughout the decades and distributed thousands of copies of the 95 page pamphlet, "Perpetual Novena and Devotions in Honour of the Immaculate Heart of Mary."

In the special centenary year – 100 years since the apparitions – the Pilgrim statue is heading to the Diocese of Armidale. Father Gerard Ryan of the Confraternity will bring the statue to the Diocese of Armidale on 10th August and he leaves on 18th August, 2017.

The statue will be spending a day in the Parishes of Walgett/Lightning Ridge; Wee Waa/Narrabri; South Tamworth; Uralla; Armidale; Tenterfield and Guyra. These Parishes are developing programmes for the pilgrimage.

This pilgrimage is the major Diocesan event in recognising the significance of the Fatima apparitions. Parishioners are encouraged to join in the celebrations in their nearest Parish.



Portugal in 1917

In the year 1917, in a mountainous region at the center of Portugal, the Mother of God appeared six times to three young children.

Elsewhere on the continent the "Great War" raged, that would cost Europe an entire generation, over 37 million lives. Besides sending her own sons to die (in France and North Africa) Portugal was in political chaos at home. There was a dizzy succession of governments following a revolution in 1910.

The monarchy had been replaced by a republic, with a new liberal constitution separating Church from state. Government officials, under the influence of Freemasonry, were not sympathetic to the Faith. But for the people themselves, the Faith was the air they breathed, as in the village of Aljustrel, a collection of whitewashed houses on a dusty road in the parish of Fatima.

There Lucia, Francisco, and Jacinta were born and raised in homes where the catechism was their daily bread, stories from the Bible their recreation, and the word of the village priest was law. Lucia de Jesus Santos was born, the youngest of seven children, to Antonio and Maria Rosa Santos, on 22 March 1907. She was a plain child with sparkling eyes and a magnetic personality, a natural leader to whom other children looked with confident affection. Blessed with an excellent memory,

Lucia was able to learn her catechism, and make her First Communion and Confession, at age six. She herself became a catechist at nine.

Lucia would be the constant guide and companion to her first cousins, Francisco and Jacinta Marto, through the trials that accompanied the apparitions of the Blessed Mother.

The Three Secrets

In 1917, the Virgin revealed the Three Secrets of Fatima to the children, which consist of prophecies about the future and have been the focus of much interest ever since. The secrets were not written down until 1941, when Lúcia was asked to compose memoirs about Fatima and her cousins so their canonization proceedings could begin.

The first secret described a horrific vision of Hell. The second secret foretold the end of World War I and the beginning of World War II and called for the "Consecration of Russia to the Immaculate Heart of Mary."

The third secret was not revealed until Easter. The secret speaks of a pope being killed by soldiers at the foot of a cross on top of a mountain, along with many other bishops and priests. John Paul himself credited Our Lady of Fatima with saving his life, when Mehmet Ali Agca attempted to assassinate him on 13th May, 1981. Saint Pope John Paul said he saw her intervening to deflect the gunman's arm and he maintained consciousness on the ride to the hospital by keeping his mind focused on her.

The "Decade a Day Children's Prayer for Peace" was initiated throughout the schools of our Diocese during May and will continue in October 2017.

This year 2017 marks the centenary year of the apparitions of the Blessed Virgin Mary to the three shepherd children at Fatima in Portugal from the 13th May to the 13th October 1917. Whilst private apparitions and revelations do not belong to the Church's Deposit of Faith the Fatima apparitions were extensively investigated and formally approved by the Church as worthy of belief. So, while the events and messages from Fatima in 1917 are not formal teachings of the Church they are encouraged because of the credible historicity of the events and because they are in harmony with the Gospel message and assist us in living the Gospel as followers of Jesus Christ.

Our Lady's urgent calls at Fatima to pray for peace and to undergo penance for the conversion of sinners have particular poignancy when we consider the historical events of the war-torn twentieth century and the large scale turning away from God which still continues today.

The Fatima apparitions have also had a very significant influence on the popular piety of Catholics over the past hundred years. Additionally, Our Lady's invitation and encouragement at Fatima that we pray the Rosary has particular significance in the Diocese of Armidale whose patron saint is the Virgin Mary under her title Our Lady of the Rosary.

Maria gratia plena: A Marian Exhibit

The South Tamworth Parish and Fr Paul Aguilar are presenting an Exhibit of various church-recognised titles of the Blessed Virgin Mary, its theme is "Maria gratia plena" (*Mary full of grace*), showcasing a remarkable array of statues, icons and images to mark the centenary of the apparitions of Our Lady at Fatima in 1917.

The display includes newspaper coverage of the apparitions. It shows photographs of crowds of seventy thousand people who gathered to witness the Miracle of the Sun.

The official portraits and the sacred relics of Sts Jacinta

and Francisco are also on display for the public veneration of the faithful.

The exhibit also contains reproductions of the famous paintings of Madonna and Child by Sandro Botticelli; the icons of the Theotokos Sweet Kiss from Mt Athos, the miraculous image of Our Lady of the Rosary of Pompeii restored by Blessed Bartolo Longo and many others.

Many have committed to offer a decade of the Rosary as part of the Million Roses campaign for peace: Will you join us?

South Tamworth Parish Hosts Filipino Diplomats

The Filipino Association of Tamworth Inc. in collaboration with the Ministry to Migrants of the Diocese of Armidale and the ADIG fostered a visit by diplomats who met and provided services to Filipino clients in the South Tamworth Parish Hall on June 3^{rd.}

The Philippine Consulate General Sydney mobile outreach team headed by Consul Atty. Melanie B. Diano, offered services such as passport renewal, dual citizenship, registration of births and marriages for Filipino Nationals. National Police Check, Overseas Voters Registration and notarial services were also provided.

Labour Attaché Atty. Rodolfo Sabulao of the Philippine Embassy in Canberra was also on hand to give information and advice on labour related matters especially on the changes in 457 visas as recently announced by Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull. He also offered counselling for those people who are experiencing work

related problems. Thirty people attended these sessions.

Although the majority of clients came from Tamworth, visitors were in attendance from throughout the Diocese and from Goondiwindi and Newcastle. Members of the local Filipino community were very pleased to host these important visitors.

Jacqui Toakley bids farewell on behalf of the Armidale Parishioners:

Last week Fr Francis spoke in his homily about parents and about priests, and it caused me to reflect on the parallels between Fr Gleeson's care for us over the last four years and the manner in which parents raise their children.

Fr Gleeson has been most like a Dad to us in his selfless devotion to our wellbeing. You have given so much of your mental, physical and spiritual energy to caring for us over the last four years, Father. Like many children, we often haven't adequately expressed our appreciation, but I want to say an enormous thank you for that today.

And there's other similarities with a good parent. Like many Dads you're always banging on at us to do our homework. You want us to be our best and you never hesitated to tell us when you thought we could do better. You worried a lot about the effect of peer pressure on us. You don't like it if you think we're listening to our friends in the secular world more than our family, the church. You've always been particularly concerned, dare I say, about the influence of our friends at the ABC. And in a manner that any parent of teenagers can relate to,






you're confident that you've got things sorted and you're really not that interested in our opinion of how the place should be run.

But I don't want to stretch the child-parent analogy too far because looking around the congregation today it's clear that most of your parishioners are adults and you've always challenged us to be adults, to take a grown-up approach to our faith and to make church matter. It's not easy to challenge other adults, or to be challenged, but it was a great blessing. Many of us did respond to your call, you shook us out of our complacency, and a more thinking, conscious approach to our faith and our Catholic life will be your legacy.

Your preaching will be greatly missed. So many people have expressed to me their sadness at no longer being able to hear your homilies. You have an extraordinarily broad knowledge of the Catholic faith and of the scriptures, and that's combined with a gift of being able to explain profound insights in a way that simple lay people can understand. It's been a privilege to listen to your homilies for the last four years. (We will all be praying for the parishioners of Glen Innes while they get used to those homilies, as I know that they're used to significantly shorter mass times up there at the moment).

I want to close with an observation a parishioner shared with me about Fr Gleeson and which I thought was a truly great compliment. You know that adage that says something like 'people won't remember what you did, and they won't remember what you said, but they will never forget how you made them feel'? I was talking to parishioner yesterday and she said to me "Jacqui, when I am with Father Gleeson I feel loved and I feel heard". I feel loved and I feel heard. I think that's one of the best things you could ever say about any Christian.

Father Gleeson, you will be missed. Thank you, good luck and God bless you.



Pentecost marks the beginning of the Church, celebrated on the fiftieth day after Easter. When the Holy Spirit came, the disciples were given the power they needed to fulfil their mission.

'When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly a sound came from heaven like the rush of a mighty wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. And there appeared to them tongues as of fire, distributed and resting on each one of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit

and began to speak in other tongues, as the Spirit gave then utterance'. (Acts 2, 14).

Christ had promised His Apostles that He would send His Holy Spirit, and, on Pentecost, they were granted the gifts of the Holy Spirit. The Apostles began to preach the Gospel in all of the languages that the Jews who were gathered there spoke, and about 3,000 people were converted and baptized that day. That is why Pentecost is often called "the birthday of the Church".

Blessings of Mary Help of Christians

The Southern Deanery priests, together with Bishop Gerard Hanna, Bishop Emeritus of the Diocese of Wagga Wagga and formerly an Armidale Diocesan priest, celebrated Mass at St Edward's Parish South Tamworth on the Solemnity of Mary Help of Christians. At the beginning of the Mass Bishop Hanna blessed the new altarpieces hanging on the wall at the back of the sanctuary. The paintings by well known Filipino artist, Mr Paul Cardenas, depict saints which are of particular significance to the parish.

The centrepiece is Mr Cardenas's version of Mary Help of Christians, the colours traditional, reflecting the strong light in rural Australia. It depicts Mary wearing a crown and proudly carrying the infant King of Kings. Behind Mary is the Southern Cross. The paintings on each side of Mary Help of Christians are of saints which are significant to our parish and country. On Mary's right is St Edward the Confessor, the saint in whose honour our parish is named. The benevolent king is offering his ring to a poor beggar. He is supported by

St Teresa of Calcutta, a modern day saint who visited Australia several times during her life. Like St Edward, she had a great affinity to the poor.

On Mary's left are St Mary of the Cross MacKillop and St Vincent de Paul. These two saints are of special significance in our parish, a parish which has a St Vincent de Paul Conference and a St Vincent de Paul store and a tradition of being very generous supporters of the poor. St Mary of the Cross is supported by St Vincent de Paul who is very important to many of our parishioners especially those who were educated by the Sisters of St Joseph in our school.

Together these three paintings do much to create an atmosphere of prayerful peace and serenity, a place set apart from the ordinary world of noise, haste and worry. They are powerful symbols and reminders of how to live a more just and prayerful life. Parishioners are grateful to Mr Cardenas for donating these paintings to our parish.

India: 275 catechists grateful for the bikes ACN supplied for their work in the local villages

In the Indian diocese of Eluru, with its 1,150-plus Catholic villages, the lay catechists play a crucially important role. For it is simply impossible for the priests to be everywhere at once, so that it falls to the catechists much of the time to prepare people for the sacraments of Baptism, First Holy Communion, Confirmation and Matrimony. They also lead prayer services and liturgies of the Word, visit the faithful in their homes and pray with the families. Thanks to the generosity of the benefactors of the Catholic charity Aid to the Church in Need (ACN), a grant of \$20,000 was given to help this cause.

By now the catechists have all received their bicycles, and Father Tatapudi Emmanuel, the diocesan bursar, wrote the following note of thanks to ACN. He wrote: "I thank you with all my heart for your generous help for the diocese of Eluru. The catechists are very happy to have these bicycles for their pastoral service. Recently we held a two-day meeting for all the catechists, and at the end of the meeting all the catechists expressed their great joy at having these bicycles. Their pastoral work will certainly be improved as a result. Together with my fellow priests, I thank you for all the help you are giving to enable us to proclaim the Gospel message to the people, and I assure you of my prayers. May Mary,

Help Religious Sisters - the unsung heroines in the Church!

Mother Teresa, now St Teresa of Calcutta, was canonised on September 4th 2016. The rosary carries the following inscriptions on the reverse side of the crucifix and central medal: "A little pencil in the hand of God" and "It is not how

much we do, but how much love we put into what we do".

Recently, Bill Gates founder of Microsoft, said that his family had rules around technology use. 

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Gonski 20 School Funding No Threat to School Fees in the Diocese of Armidale

The Catholic Schools Office (Diocese of Armidale) supports the Federal Government's introduction of a needs based funding formula. We appreciate the increased funding flowing to Catholic schools in NSW in 2018 and the guarantee of annual increases over the next ten years. The Catholic Schools Office (Diocese of Armidale) does not believe that school



fees will need to increase in 2018 by any more than what would otherwise normally occur.

We do not believe the concerns of the Catholic sector regarding the new Gonski 2.0 funding arrangements are being well explained by both sides of the debate. The government is increasing education funding (even if not to the extent proposed by Gonski 1.0) and this is commendable.

The government is attempting to ensure that over the next 10 years all schools (government, Catholic and independent) are equally funded to the same School Resource Standard (SRS). The problem for the government is that all schools at the moment are not starting from the same level when compared to this standard.

To add to this variation is the difference between the amount of funding provided for education in the different States and Territories of Australia. The government has a goal that all schools will reach the same SRS and the contribution to education funding will be 80% (Federal) and 20% (States & Territories). This will require cooperation from the State governments and acceptance by the various education sectors that the starting point is different at the present time.

The Catholic sector's main concern is around their autonomy as a system. Earlier this month, the Federal

Government released figures outlining its planned funding allocation for schools in 2018 and beyond. It also produced a calculator on its *Quality* Schools website which purported to show funding figures for each school for 2017 and 2018. These figures are **not** an accurate reflection of the money **actually received** by each school. This is because – as the government's website itself notes – the amounts listed **do not take into account the impact of the Catholic Education system's "group funding"** arrangements. (Under this system, all Federal funding for Catholic schools is pooled together, and then redistributed according to a needs-based formula which reflects locally-identified areas of need.)

Thus, the raw federal funding figures listed on the website are not reflective of the actual amounts received by each Catholic school, now or in the future. Some schools will receive more than the figures listed on the website; others will receive less. This occurs because we are running a low fee paying system of schools.

Therefore the Catholic sector is just seeking an undertaking from the Federal government that it will retain the autonomy to distribute funds between and within Dioceses in NSW in such a way that we can maintain a low fee paying school system and maintain schools in high SES areas and small schools in regional areas because they belong to a system. Nevertheless we appreciate the government's insistence that the needs based approach to funding enshrined in the Education Act Amendment 2017 should be strongly reflected in the distribution of the government's funding by the Catholic sector .

The Catholic Schools Office (Diocese of Armidale) appreciates the efforts of Simon Birmingham (Minister for Education) to engage with the Catholic sector in order to better understand the role of systems in supporting the economic realities of Catholic schools.

"Our people are struggling simply to survive"- in a powerful pastoral letter, the Bishops of South Sudan have expressed a desperate plea for support.

United Nations agencies recently declared famine in parts of South Sudan and it's a famine that is likely to spread. Caritas Australia's CEO, Paul O'Callaghan said without concerted political and community action, there is the risk of famine spreading across the region.

"With over 20 million people at risk of starvation, this is a major humanitarian disaster that requires our urgent action. It's vital for us to do whatever we can to assist, before it's too late and the worst of this large-scale fine becomes entrenched," Mr O'Callaghan said.

"This is an unprecedented situation and may be the gravest food security event since the 1984 famine that devastated the people of Ethiopia.

"Caritas recently launched its **Africa Emergency Appeal to raise life-saving funds for those in need.**"

Caritas Australia, in collaboration with the Caritas Internationalis network, has a long history of working successfully with desperately poor communities in the affected countries of Africa.

Mary Wachira, Caritas Project Coordinator, who works on the ground with communities in South Sudan said: "Caritas' unique reach through the Church into vulnerable communities means that it is well-placed to support those in need."

Through the generous support of Australians, Caritas is providing people with essential food and water, as well as continuing our long term development work so communities have resilience in the face of future threats.

"When you have no food, you have nothing. We must act before our worst fears are realised," Ms Wachira said.

This humanitarian disaster is being driven in many areas by conflict, as well as sky rocketing food prices due to inflation, while climate change is compounding a severe drought throughout the Horn of Africa. The long term impacts of climate change are undermining the region's ability to endure extreme weather, leaving thousands of people vulnerable to hunger and disease.

"While this is a moment to act to secure communities immediate access to food and water and sustainable crops, it is also a moment to reflect on the role of climate change," Mr O'Callaghan said. "If we don't move aggressively to tackle climate change, we will see more and more of these events in the future."


debating skills, as well as social interaction with other motivated youth and experienced Rotarians.

Four priests con-celebrated the Mass where Mon was remembered as a woman of great faith whose generosity knew no bounds". "Respected and admired by the whole community, Mon was described as a shining example of how we should live our lives in harmony".

Mon's son Tom said that his mother was a woman of vision, a progressive, while still embracing the traditions of the church. "She did the simple things really beautifully," he said. We will always remember her as a truly remarkable and inspirational mother. "She was a joy to be with, never short of a joke. It flowed from her love of God and humanity."

Mon has left a wonderful legacy to her eight children, 19 grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren. St Joseph's parishioners continue to give thanks for the joy of Mon's presence in their lives.



promising time of prayer and reflection on the testimony of missionary saints and martyrs, the Bible and theology, as well as catechesis and charitable missionary work towards the evangelization of the Church.


Father Lucas is expecting a strong spirit of collaboration in the Church in preparation for the special occasion.

'Catholic Mission looks forward to working closely with the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference, and the local bishops, parishes and religious congregations to make October 2019 a time for all Australian Catholics to recommit to their baptismal calling to be missionaries of Christ's saving message,' he said. 'Energy for mission has to replace a self-serving inward focus that is content with the status quo.'

There are about 1 million seafarers on the world's oceans on any given day.

Piracy is a scourge on the lives of seafarers, with 246 acts of piracy on shipping in 2015 alone, and in that year - about 20 ships were held hostage, and around 200 crew were held hostage. Some crew are killed or remain hostage for years. Much of this criminal activity occurs in the oceans surrounding Australia.

Apart from isolation and distance from family while at sea, seafarers can be confronted with very real threats and danger to their lives, as well as poor working conditions on some ships, so much so that mental health for seafarers has become a primary concern of union and church groups. Suicide, depression and self-harming is common, creating situations in ministry and pastoral care previously not encountered.

About 90% of Australia's trade is reliant on shipping. Various ports scattered around the coastline deal with the export/import of goods and services. Australia trades

in commodities, livestock and produce, together with a service trade that is generally leisure, with over 1.5 million Australians holidaying on cruise liners per year.

Cargo vessels generally do not have large crews, but the volume of shipping is huge. The cruise liner industry relies on crews of 1,000 or 1,500, but the cargo volume is less. Commercial shipping would have thousands of ships visit Australian ports every year, whereas only 500-600 cruise liners visit per annum.

Some busy Australian ports can have about 10,000 seafarers visit the local Stella Maris centre every year, with many ships in local harbours on any given day.

The Apostleship of the Sea Catholic ministry (AOS) offers a 'beacon of light' to seafarers around the world by providing pastoral support for their 'spiritual, social and material' welfare. In Australia there are 15 AOS port chaplains / centre managers and more than 160 volunteers supporting the estimated 130,000 seafarers who transit the nation's 25 ports each year through these centres.


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
